# Regenstein 1st floor to offer enhanced services

With the initial movement of print volumes (bound journals and extra large folio volumes, as well as some special collections materials) from Regenstein to Mansueto, new possibilities have been opened up for space use in Regenstein Library. Renovations to Regenstein's 1st floor began this summer and are scheduled for completion in mid-October. The renovated space will offer a more conveniently located reference desk, new furniture, and a new IT Services support counter. Later in the quarter, there will be a new Ex Libris Café. Read more.

### Regenstein collections on the move in 2011-2012

The movement of print materials to Mansueto has also given the Library the opportunity to rationalize and reorganize its collections in their entirety in order to create a more straightforward arrangement that will benefit researchers for many years to come. Over the course of the academic year, nearly every book in Regenstein Library (except those in the Special Collections Research Center) will be moved within the building. Most of the religion reference collection will remain in the fourth floor reading area, along with the Classics Reading Room, the Judaica Reference Collection, and the books currently on the Ancient Near East Study tables.
